The first ISCRAM Newsletter! - promote and facilitate cooperation between all parties, including researchers, practitioners, professionals, technical and other experts, policy makers, involved in the management or evaluation of emergency conditions, disasters and crises.

The newsletter – to become a regular feature of ISCRAM – will help us achieve these ends. And to do that we need help!

As you will see, as you turn the pages of this issue, many of the sections are place holders, indications of how *you* might help by joining the Newsletter team and helping us develop it building the ISCRAM network, bringing together people and ideas. According to the ISCRAM constitution, every year one third of the board members should stand for re-election. Of the current 10 board members, this implies that 4 people have to take up the challenge of re-election, and declare their board seats vacant. This year, Simon French, Frank Fiedrich, Song Yan and Bartel Van de Walle will stand for re-election; also board member Paul Burghardt has decided to step down. This means that 5 positions will be

declared vacant for the following election, and every ISCRAM member is invited to stand for one of these vacant board positions. Visit the site and register now. Early registration closes on March 23rd, 2011 and you can renew your membership of ISCRAM at the same time.



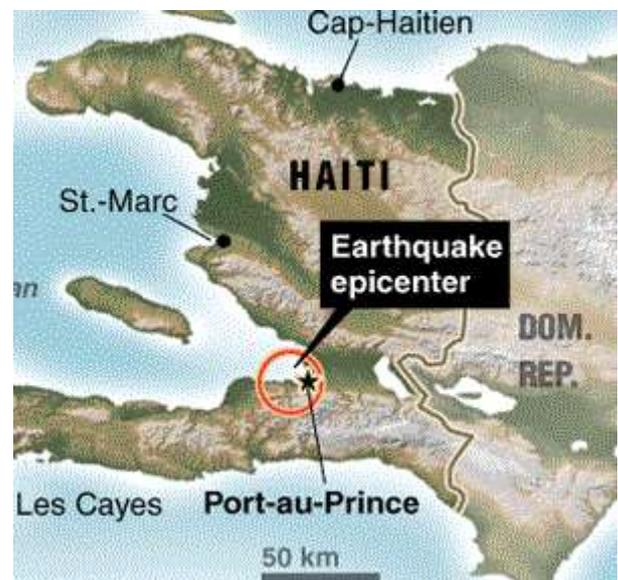

ISCRAM Summer School

The 4th ISCRAM Summer School will take place in Tilburg from August 17 to 26, 2011. The format and structure of

the summer school has been totally revised, focusing on information systems and logistics aspects of humanitarian response. The program has been developed by Bartel Van de Walle (University of Tilburg) and Paulo Goncalves (University of Lugano), while internationally renowned organisations such as UN OCHA, JRC Ispra, ICT4Peace and B-FAST have joined as foundational partners and will contribute to the contents of the summer school. Future ISCRAM conferences

Planning for ISCRAM2012 has begun with a location set and a team in place. Watch for an announcement very soon! Moreover, we are in negotiations about the location of ISCRAM2013 and an announcement on that will also follow soon. The ISCRAM Board is now turning its mind to ISCRAM2014 and looking for bids to host that. One of the board's key objectives over the past couple of years has been to secure and improve our conferences with longer planning cycles. We are getting there.

Governance, Constitution and By-Laws

As a community and conference, ISCRAM has been active for nearly a decade, but as a formal international non-profit organization, ISCRAM is less than two years old. Most non-profits rely on three key documents to govern their purpose, structure and operations: (1) the foundational statutes, or Constitution, that establish the broad structure and fundamental principles of the organization; (2) the higher-level procedures, or By-Laws, that operationally interpret and are consistent with the Constitution; and (3) the day-to-day operational guidelines, or Policies and Procedures, that capture the way the organization has agreed to do its business within the structures of the two higher-level documents. ISCRAM's Constitution was formalized in June 2009 as part of the process that established it as a registered international non-profit under Belgium law, but we do not as yet have formally approved By-Laws, nor have we formally gathered our operational practices into a Policies and Procedures document. The current ISCRAM Board is busily working on just that, with the aim that our first By-Laws will be ready for consideration by the General Assembly at our upcoming international conference in Lisbon. We look forward to working with the General Assembly to establish a sound foundation of principles, structures and operations that will serve our growing and vital organization for many years.
